Region 10 Board Meeting Minutes September 23, 2021 Via Hybrid Zoom Video Conference and In Person at Region 10, 145 S Cascade Ave, Montrose CO

- 1. CALL TO ORDER and INTRODUCTIONS-Meeting was called to order at 12:03.
 - a. In Person: Michelle Haynes (Region 10), Trish Thibodo (Region 10), Dan Scinto (Region 10), Nancy Murphy (Region 10), Eva Veitch (Region 10), Corey Bryndal (Region 10), Courtney Rodwell (Region 10), Vince Rogalski (Gunnison/GVTPR)

2. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

a. Addition of Enterprise Zone Approval: Business Items c.

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES for August 26, 2021, Board Meeting

Motion to approve: M/S: Ben Tisdel/Kristie Borchers as accepted. None opposed.

- 4. Business Items:
 - a. Grant Update/Approval: Have not yet heard back from the USDA. Economic Adjustment Grants are due October 1st.
 - i. Submitted DOLA REDI Grant for Entrepreneur Program and now submitting for the second grant for Kitchen Center.
 - ii. Match USD: 80/20, REDI is 25% year 1 and 50% year 2 receiving building lease in-kind that is a match, with investment from Montrose County, Olathe, Delta County.
 - iii. Kristie: Hinsdale County is also submitting a REDI Grant for a Hub
 - iv. City of Delta: Is also submitting for a potential CO-Working Space.
 - v. Amounts: EDA: \$1.6 million (just under 80% ask on that, \$1.2 million), REDI Grant: \$250,000 ask

Action Item: Support the Olathe Business Center with Grant Application Approve Grants for the 2nd Round of the REDI Grant for \$250,000 and EDA Grant for \$1.6 Million

Motion to Approve: M/S: Jon Waschbusch/Ben Tisdel. None opposed.

- b. **Build Back Better Grant:** Trish overviewed: 50-60 Phase 1 Regions who are then eligible for Phase 2 (20-30) funding next year.
 - i. **AGNC, Just Transitions, South Eastern Utah:** Phase 2 application \$500,000 to fund Regional Economic Development Competitive Coordinator. Supports pre-development applications.
 - ii. Increase Regional Coordination throughout our communities, including broadband connection to NW area of state.
 - iii. AGNC is facing Hayden shutting down their Power Plant
 - iv. Rail Transportation Hub in Grand Junction.
 - v. Basic Infrastructure rather than new industries.
 - 1. Manufacturing Innovation Centers
 - vi. Regional Applicant for Phase 1 and then each of the Communities will put in individual applications for Phase 2. Will be competitive (on a call today with 600 other people) Fairly good chance for Phase 1 because of the coal-impacted communities.
 - vii. Discussion:
 - Roland: Think it is a good idea to work with the Northwest Region especially to get Broadband connection, (Broadband GAP and infrastructure study for Broadband in the Northern part of the state.)
 - 2. Ben Tisdel: Were other areas of coordination discussed? Would like to see regional water coordination. We are partnering with AGNC Associated Governments of Northern Colorado. Northwest COGs Coordination on water is something that we can reach out and talk with them about their work on water.
 - 3. Will be meeting up with Northwest COG about Broadband?

4. One of the benefits of Region 10 not being first to the table on Broadband was that we got to see what other communities did and see how to improve upon what they had done. Goal with broadband is to connect all of our regions.

- d. Enterprise Zone Approval: Home Trust of Ouray County
 - i. Goal of expanding housing for workforce housing. In the process of obtaining their 501c3
 - ii. Land donations and donations

Action Item: Approve Home Trust of Ouray County for becoming an Enterprise Zone Project

Motion to Approve: M/S: Ben Tisdel/Kristie Borchers. None opposed.

5. Reports:

- a. Executive Director/Financial Report Michelle Haynes
 - i. Did not bring financial statements, working on June 30th statements for the audit in November.
 - ii. Making a large broadband adjustment to the financials as the grants have ended.
 - iii. Jo Lance accountant that has been working with us for a bit over year and is doing an outstanding job with them.
 - iv. Gotten new program funding: SBA TA was a large increase (SBDC will be doubled over the next 4 years.)
 - 1. From \$80,000 to \$160,000 and the first half will be a match of \$80,000
 - 2. Continuing to work with WEEDC, considering a new position in Gunnison to serve the Gunnison and Hinsdale County Area.
 - 3. Looking for some contracted positions in the Ouray or Delta County area.
 - 4. Been approached by some of the communities that feel like they could use some additional capacity for writing grants or understanding what is out there. Supported by Kris & Ben.
 - a. It's not just grant writing but also the grant administration and management.
- b. Small Business Resource Center Nancy
 - i. Training numbers are larger and consulting numbers are smaller
 - ii. Developing 2022 programing.
 - iii. Susan is teaching the Smart Start class and about 4-5 people are attending about every 3 weeks
 - iv. Are now in the 3rd week of the Business Leading Edge Class with about 10 people.
 - v. Attending the annual SBDC meeting.
 - 1. Stimulus, Debt & Debt Ceiling, Unemployment and Housing all potential problems for the amount of recovery.
- c. Business Loan Fund Dan Scinto
 - i. Received a payment on a charged-off loan.
 - ii. Operating part of the loan program is going well
 - iii. CHFA has funded the Colorado Credit Reserve Program borrower agrees to register loan with CHFA,
 - 1. \$190,000 Reserve for Loan Loss Allows us to take on riskier loans, helps us with start-ups, and un-bankable loans.
 - iv. Matt Evans works with CASA in Montrose and he does a financial literacy program for them and we have discussed identifying someone with an entrepreneurial spirit that has gone through the CASA Transitional housing program and his financial literacy program we could put together a small loan for a start-up for them.
- d. Community Development Trish Thibodo
 - i. Roadmap to Recovery:
 - 1. Had first meeting last week, with two more meetings in the beginning of October.
 - 2. Other items (grants) discussed in the first portion of the meeting.
- e. Community Living Services Eva Veitch
 - i. VOA, who is the vendor for Senior CommUnity meals in 7 locations, has mandated vaccines and we have lost the key chef/cook in the West End. Filling that program with Mom's Meals in the meantime while a cook is being hired. Older Americans Act funding will be paying for that.
 - ii. We will lose frozen meals in Montrose but we can fill that in with the Shepherd's Hand meal program.
 - iii. Volunteer Recognition Event next week expecting about 50-60 of our volunteers.
 - iv. Struggling to get the community para-medicine program up and running. Seems like some of the problem is that these outlying communities do not want to pay to come to Montrose/Delta. In some counties the Fire Chiefs and the Ambulance Districts do not feel like there is a need for Para-Medicine. And so I am reaching out to key community members to shift the thinking about Para-Medicine.

- 1. Roland Mason & Kris Holstrom: Will you send some of the contacts that you have reached out to in Gunnison so that I can reach out as well to discuss.
- f. Broadband Michelle for Corey Bryndal
 - i. Corey is at a meeting in Cortez today about expanding network connections.
 - ii. Hinsdale County grant is getting finished up for submittal next week for Broadband to Lake City
 - iii. Discussion with private provides about service in Pitkin. There is a line to Ohio City that could possible be connected.
 - iv. San Miguel County: Telluride Foundation in discussion with Tri-State regarding easement perfection.
 - v. Gunnison County line between Gunnison and Crested Butte and up to Mt Crested Butte and we got some good news that the fiber line between Crested Butte and Mt Crested Butte is in good shape; working on potential funding for project.

g. Gunnison Valley Transportation Region Committee - Vince Rogalski

- i. Transportation Commission usually does a road trip in September and it is to identify and let everyone know what is going on with I-70 with the damage from flooding and to visit both of the control centers for the tunnels. Working on a box culvert that channels water from the freeway to the River.
 - 1. Eisenhower tunnel has a lot of need for
 - 2. Hanging Lakes Tunnel control center is in the middle of the tunnel.
- ii. Money from different sources coming in from CDOT
 - 1. Revitalizing Main Street Program (Montrose & Delta got money from the first round and were 2 of 16 projects funded); Round 2 opened up because they received so much interest. Those that were not funded in round 1 are encouraged to apply once open.
 - 2. MMOF Multi Modal Mitigation Option Fund: give each of the TPRs a pot of money and the people within the region can apply to the TRP and the TPR makes the final decision on projects that receive money.
 - a. PA Stimulus Money
 - b. Senate Bill 260
- iii. Mike Snow will provide a full presentation at the TPR meeting next week. If you have Multi Modal projects those are things that you should be thinking about and attend the TPR meeting next week. It is beneficial that the TPR gets to decide for the allocation to the projects.
 - 1. Bike & Pedestrian Projects, including trails.
 - 2. Reducing transportation on the roads is the goal of these projects.
- iv. 10-Year Projects: While communities are not required to reduce Greenhouse Gases CDOT is required by the state. And so CDOT will be reprioritizing projects based on reductions of Greenhouse Gases.
- v. Meetings for TPR: besides the meeting next week they would like to have 2 more TPR meetings by the end of the year. How does Region 3 & 5 CDOT, when do they want these meetings to happen.

Motion to approve Reports: M/S: as accepted. None opposed.

6. Roundtable Discussion

- a. San Miguel County:
 - i. **Kris Holstrom (San Miguel County):** Continuing the Broadband project. Mask mandate for public indoor places and it is likely that will continue a little longer. Water fluency class that I am taking. On Monday we had a field trip with the San Miguel Watershed Partnership. Regenerative Ag tour is scheduled so that they can see 6 different agricultural areas.
 - ii. **Mike Bordogna (San Miguel County):** Telluride Valley Floor project is finishing up with the restoration. Approved sketch plan for commercial and residential development.

b. Ouray County:

i. **Ben:** San Miguel Power Authority...We are looking for potential property acquisition for housing. Silver mine is picking up production and they turned on the milling plant. We will see demands on housing and transit from that. Started our recreation planning in conjunction with San Miguel & Gunnison counties

c. Gunnison County:

- i. **Jim Schmidt (Crested Butte):** Sales Tax continues to grow. Raise sales tax to 9.9%, \$H2500 flat rate tax for home owners who ... Electric vehicles for our budget next year, for any vehicle that we replace. Ordered a hybrid loader.
- ii. **Michael Bacani (Mt Crested Butte):** Having an open house for our community next week. Have a couple of housing items going on, PUD for the North Village is being worked through with the Planning Commission. 22-Unit affordable housing was supposed to be completed this fall and best case is that it looks like early summer next year to be finished. The families who had contracts are now displaced.

iii. Roland Mason (Gunnison County): We just passed a controversial measure to land use resolution....Have a mask mandate in our School system that was put into place last week. Saw a spike in the Delta variant and the School System voted to put that into place. Strong sales tax as well with the county up 26% since last year. Brush Creek Intersection meeting on October 7th at 4:30pm at the Elevation Hotel on Mt Crested Butte.

d. Montrose County:

i. Jon Waschbusch: Expansion for Montrose Regional Airport has been approved and is for \$33.1 million. 20,000 square feet of additional space with terminals and restaurant spaces. 2021 is expected to be a record year and we are greatly exceeding 2019 numbers. At the south end of the terminal, we will be adding another 5,000 square feet for ticketing. Southwest has continued their schedule. Delta will be back for ski season. 8,000 square feet within the terminal to retrofit and provide an additional story for baggage claims. We were at 100% capacity if not over for parking throughout the summer. Sales tax is up. Acceptance of positions have been rescinded because of lack of housing for those recruits. Budget Prep and presenting to BOCC on October 11th.





- On Fri, Sept 17 we co-hosted a CDOT Construction Forum with Grand Junction SBDC with 72 online attendees.
- The annual SBDC conference was held online, Tues, Sept 21- Fri, Sept 24, and included lots of great content and inspiration.
- I was invited to speak at Central Mountain SBDC's Power of WE (Women Entrepreneurs) conference about "When Women Undervalue and Underprice Their Work" (and tips for pricing intangible services) on Mon, Sept 27. This issue is prevalent among women business owners. I'm currently in discussion with our accounting instructor about expanding the topic into a monthly online series around money mind set and profitability for 2022, leveraging Minority Business Office (MBO) funds.

Community Development Update: October 2021

Recovery Projects:

- EDA Build Back Better: submitted a regional BBB Phase One application which contained projects from Hayden, Craig (2 projects), Grand Junction Regional Airport, Delta, West End and Gunnison and expansion of R10 Broadband Network to NW Colorado. Clusters: Light Manufacturing (with a sub focus on Outdoor Recreation), Innovation Centers (with a sub focus on energy innovation). Regional projects include broadband expansion and expanding GJT cargo airport ramp.
- DOLA/OEDIT Roadmap to Recovery TA: The High Alpine project which includes Hinsdale, Ouray and San Miguel Counties (Along with San Juan and Dolores County) completed Phase One Groundwork in September. Consultant has been paired with the group and we will begin working with them shortly.
- **REDI Grant Applications:** Submitted a REDI grant to support the Innovation and Entrepreneurship Kitchen Program with additional equipment and expanding the Kitchen Manager to provide regional support to other kitchen programs.
- Regional Data Project: Ongoing and added several of the dashboards to our website.
- **Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy:** CEDS was submitted to the EDA the last week of September.
- Region 10 Innovation Center Proposal: Although not public yet, Region 10's USDA Rural Innovation Stronger Economies was awarded for \$1.7 million dollars to support both renovation and operations of the Innovation Center. Region 10 was one of 11 projects selected across the U.S. and was the second highest award.
- **Grant research:** ongoing reviewing the different funding opportunities coming from EDA and USDA

Community Projects

- **Delta County-** Continue to participate as an ex-officio member of the One Delta County Board of Directors and the Employee Training Committee.
- **Hinsdale County** in discussion with DIRT about potential eco devo projects.
- **Regional Food System Partnership** Valley Food Partnership has suspended monthly meetings as they focus on other aspects of the project
- **Just Transition Communities:** Continue meeting with the staff of the Colorado Office of Just Transitions
- Montrose: Met with the City, Rec District and CO Outdoors (along with OEDIT) to discuss if there was any potential EDA Outdoor Rec and Tourism Grant (at this time no projects identified)
- Habitat/TCR continue meeting regularly with Erica Madison and Allen Golden on the development of a pilot project of skilled trades students at TCR getting on the job training building Habitat homes.

We will be working with other projects for approval through the end of the year: Ridgeway Concert Series, One Delta County: An Economic Alliance and Ouray County Historical Society Phase Two Capital Campaign.
- **EZCP Annual Reports** were completed by projects. ICELab decided to not continue their project.

Community Living Services (CLS) Director Report Oct 2021

Funding updates

We have applied for funding for the Senior Companion Program up to this point we have been funding this under the AAA as a demonstration program. If awarded this will be a 2-year grant decided in March of 2022.

We have applied again for the Telluride Foundation Grant for the West End Senior Services Collaboration, this grant helps support All Points Transit, Senior Community Meals, the Homemaker program, N2N and TCHNetwork for Options Counseling.

I will be seeking \$1.5 million from SB-290 for Senior Supportive Housing and seeking additional funding elsewhere for this project.

Program updates

AAA-meals-We lost the cook for Nucla & Norwood due to the vaccine mandate and the program has thus far been unable to hire a replacement, so we have shifted to a different model called Moms Meals. We will resume normal operations ASAP.

We are negotiating with Community Options to create a consumer directed in-home services program to reduce the wait list.

Ombudsman

We had a program evaluation of the Ombudsman program and received glowing reviews.

RSVP

We have hired a part-time coordinator for Delta County to assist in getting both RSVP & Senior Companion off the ground. Our partnership with Habitat for the handy helper program is in the early stages, we desperately need this program in all counties to help with ramps, grab bars and minor home maintenance issues.

SHIP Open enrollment is underway all our counselors are busy.

Other

We had a State Unit on Aging Desk evaluation this month, we do not expect any issues.

We are working with CASA to purchase land and develop a supportive housing project in Montrose that will house young adults aging out of foster care and older adults at risk of homelessness with mental illness. This will be a tiny home village with a community center that will provide on-sight supports. Funding is needed, we hope to break ground in April of 2022.

Broadband Report to the Board

- Region 10 staff is preparing DOLA grant application for Lake City in Hinsdale County. All commitment letters have been received including match from GCEA. A CNL location has been identified in partnership with Visionary Broadband. Fiber construction in Lake City is anticipated to begin in the spring of 2022.
- Region 10 staff continues to work with **Ouray County** in **Ouray, CO** and has addressed several issues regarding the Ouray County Public Health Network. Attorney Ken Fellman prepared an amendment to address one spare conduit. The amendment was shared to Ouray County for approval. We plan to accept the fiber, complete a management agreement and already have several interested parties seeking both IRU and lit services along the route.
- Region 10 staff continues to work with the Telluride Foundation as they seek to address two remaining ROW agreements in **San Miguel County**. All parties agreed to proceed to procurement of equipment in anticipation of a resolution. Recent discussions between Telluride Foundation and Sri-State G&T point towards a Q1 2022 resolution of outstanding ROW challenges. An extension of the existing IRU purchase agreement was put in place as ROW perfection efforts continue.
- In light of the denial by the Universal Service Administration Company of the grant to Gunnison Valley Health for the **Gunnison** to **Crested Butte** and **Mount Crested Butte** fiber project Region 10 has sought additional funding opportunities. Staff met with representatives of GCEA, and have a meeting planned with Local Technology Planning Team members to discuss Federal and State funding options. We are working with contractor Deeply Digital to address acquisition and transport of the fiber cable media that was produced for this project.
- Revised designs and cost estimates have come back for a new CNL location in **Mt. Crested Butte.** The CNL is now planned for the central parking facility in the ground level of The Lodge at Mountaineer Square. This location is central to the town, close to Gothic Road and offers use of an



existing building. Details are being worked out with the Town, Vail Resorts and the building's HOA. The Town is including conduit builds in it's sidewalk replacement efforts.

- We are estimating CNL and fiber later build costs to serve CB South. Several ISP's have indicated interest in this community.
- Gunnison Rising developments east of town have broken ground. We feel it is important to connect with stakeholders and plan for communications infrastructure now for these strategic development projects.
- Region 10 staff continues to work with DOLA, Colorado Broadband Office and adjacent Regions to expand middle mile infrastructure and improve redundancy throughout the state. Potential partner projects include Rifle, Glenwood Springs, Fruita/Grand Junction/Palisade, Colbran, Durango & Cortez and Pagosa Springs.
- Through our partnership with Visionary Communications we will soon receive a 5 Gigabit transport circuit into Denver using the new Cottonwood Pass path. This will benefit all of Region 10's existing service locations with added capacity and redundancy.
- Routers have arrived and are starting to be prepared for improved services along the Region 10 network. Once ready, they will be placed in Gunnison, Montrose and Grand Junction. An additional appliance router will be placed in Denver colocation space. We are working to improve visibility and management of the existing network elements.

10-Year Plan Update and Fiscal Constraint

SUBJECT: 10-Year Plan Update and Fiscal Constraint

<u>Purpose</u>

This memo explains the timing and process to update the 10-Year Plan and includes a discussion on anticipated available funding for 10-Year Plan projects.

Action

No action is required. This agenda topic is for informational and discussion purposes only.

Background

Projects in the 10-Year Plan were based on statewide outreach, funneled through rural Transportation Planning Region (TPR) and Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) prioritization within the framework of TC guiding principles. The 10-Year plan represents a multimodal approach to planning with transit and highway projects combined together to address our transportation challenges and needs.

With the near completion of the first four years of the 10-Year Plan Strategic Pipeline of Projects, it is now time to prioritize and advance projects from the out years of the plan considering the sustainable funding provided by SB 260 as well as Colorado's share of the federal infrastructure funding. Lastly, SB260 requires CDOT to update it's plan to be in

compliance with the new standard for greenhouse gas emissions.

Details

Staff has developed a draft 10-Year Plan update schedule that includes Transportation Commission discussions on revisions to the prioritization framework in November which will be used to assist in the prioritization process for the 10-Year Plan update over the next several months. An accelerated schedule has been proposed in order to position the Department to begin allocating revenues and implementing the Greenhouse Gas requirements also identified in SB 260.

The Division of Accounting and Finance has developed an estimate for planning purposes of reasonably anticipated revenue through CDOT and the Enterprises that may be available to fund the updated 10-Year Plan. Over the next four years this is estimated to total approximately \$2 billion or \$500 million/year, and approximately \$400 million or \$200 million/year in subsequent "out years".

In the next four years (year 5-8, or FY 23-FY 27), this totals approximately \$2 billion or \$500 million/year on average through CDOT, Bridge and Tunnel Enterprise, High Performance Transportation Enterprise, and the Non-Attainment Enterprise, with resources split relatively evenly between CDOT and the Enterprises. This estimate incorporates both "net new" revenue through SB 21-260 (i.e. revenues above FY 22 baseline levels, after accounting for

debt service due on SB 17-267 Certificates of Participation (COPs), as well as anticipated incremental revenue (above FAST Act levels) included in the proposed federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act. Additionally, the estimate of available revenues has been reduced to "set aside" an amount estimated to be required to "keep up" with inflation in Maintenance and Operations programs. Specific sources in the estimate include:


- Anticipated SB 17-267 revenue remaining from the fourth and final issuance, after funding remaining "year 4" projects.
- Incremental HUTF revenue (including new SB 21-260 HUTF revenue)
- Multimodal Mitigation Options Fund revenue (CDOT share only; funded through SB 21-260)
- Incremental federal-aid highway program revenue (above current FAST Act levels) from the proposed Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, including flexible revenue to CDOT, the new Risk and Resiliency Program, and new bridge program.
- Non-Attainment Enterprise revenue (funded through SB 21-260)
- Anticipated project-specific financing through the High-Performance Transportation Enterprise
- Anticipated project-specific funding and financing through the Bridge and Tunnel

Enterprise (funded in part through new SB 21-260 revenue)

An estimate has also been developed for subsequent "out years" (years 9-10 or FY 27-FY 28 and beyond). The "out year" estimate is significantly lower, primarily due to an assumed return to "more typical" levels of federal funding in transportation authorizations following the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, and increasing costs of keeping up with inflation in Maintenance and Operations programs. This estimate totals approximately \$200 million/year on average through CDOT, Bridge and Tunnel Enterprise, High Performance Transportation Enterprise, and the Non-Attainment Enterprise, with resources split relatively evenly between CDOT and the Enterprises.

Next Steps:

- Confirming Year 4 Projects: Staff will review the remaining unfunded projects identified in the 4th year of the original 10-Year Plan, which will be discussed with the Commissioner in November.
- Timeline: The proposed schedule was developed to ensure a transparent, stakeholder focused process. This schedule includes TPR discussions on project priorities from years 5-10 of the 10-Year Plan and coordination with the MPOs on those same priority discussion.

STAC Discussion Summary

- There was concern about future funds should the federal infrastructure bill fail to pass.
- There was discussion on coordinating CDOT and TPR/MPO schedules for the 10-Year Plan update process.
- It was requested that CDOT commit to finishing Years 1-4 projects before starting Year 5-10 projects.
- STAC members were concerned about the vagueness of the term "Regionally Significant Project."

• Even though I-25 segment 5 has a Record of Decision (ROD) as part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process, it will still need to undergo analysis to check compliance with the GHG rule.

Legislative Report – Andy Karsian, CDOT Office of Policy and Government Relations; Jamie Grim, CDOT Office of Policy and Government Relations

- Staff reviewed state bills relating to Idaho Stops. The Idaho Stop bill would allow cyclists, pedestrians, and electric scooters to make the determination whether to stop at intersections, including traffic lights. CDOT has concerns about electric scooters and the application of the bill to school zones, and is recommending limiting the bill to 4-way stop signs.
- The CDOT legislative agenda includes enforcement of mountain express lane closures using photo enforcement.
- On the federal level, there is a stalemate in Congress regarding the infrastructure bill and reconciliation bill (a.k.a. Build Back Better). The debt ceiling has been extended to early December. Transportation and Fast Act funding have been reauthorized through a continuing resolution through the end of the month. The goal in the House is to vote before October 31.

Last month we talked about GHG. Here are STAC's most resent comments

Discussion Summary

• STAC members expressed concerns about the Rule: potential for project cost increases due to mitigation, problems with the algorithm for determining GHG emissions, bias against capacity projects, vagueness of the terms "Regionally Significant" and "transportation terminals," applicability of mitigation measures in rural areas, representation of the rural areas on the interagency group that can modify definitions in the Rule, and VMT modeling assumptions being too far removed from reality.

Multimodal Transportation and Mitigation Options Fund (MMOF) Process Update – Heather Sloop, Northwest TPR Representative

• The MMOF Advisory Committee has met twice and reviewed the Distribution Formula for the rural/urban split, distribution within the Urban and Rural breakouts, and also the Match Reduction Formula. The Committee's recommendations will be presented at the November STAC.
